(Los Angeles, CA) Jan 14, 2025 — The new year at The Soraya begins with international percussion sensation *STOMP*, with three performances on Sat & Sun, Jan. 18 & 19, and continues later this season with additional family-friendly events *Yamato: The Drummers of Japan*, and *Defying Gravity: An Evening with Stephen Schwartz and friends*.

This week, The Soraya announces the immensely talented cast who will accompany Schwartz in his Soraya debut. The evening will feature the hits of his vast catalog with Schwartz at the piano leading Tony Award-winner **Debbie Gravitte**, **Michael McCorry Rose** (most recently in the film adaptation of Schwartz' *Wicked*), one of New York's most honored vocalists **Scott Coulter**, pianist **John Boswell**, and actor and singer **Shaleah Adkisson**.

From its beginnings as a street performance in the UK, STOMP has grown into an international sensation over the past 30 years, having performed in more than 50 countries and in front of more than 26 million people. Now celebrating its 30th anniversary, the group returns to The Soraya for three performances — Jan. 18 at 3 p.m. and 8 p.m. and Jan. 19 at 3 p.m.

The performers "make a rhythm out of anything we can get our hands on that makes a sound," says co-founder/director Luke Cresswell. A unique combination of percussion, movement and visual comedy, STOMP has created its own inimitable, contemporary form of rhythmic expression: both household and industrial objects find new life as musical instruments in the hands of an idiosyncratic band of body percussionists. It is a journey through sound, a celebration of the everyday and a comic interplay of characters wordlessly communicating through dance and drum.

Synchronized stiff-bristle brooms become a sweeping orchestra, eight Zippo lighters flip open and closed to create a fiery fugue; wooden poles thump and clack in a rhythmic explosion. **STOMP** uses everything <u>but</u> conventional percussion instruments - dustbins, suitcases, radiator hoses, boots, hub caps - to fill the stage with a compelling and unique act that is often imitated but never duplicated.

YAMATO: THE DRUMMERS OF JAPAN

YAMATO is a Japanese Taiko drumming group based in Asuka-mura Nara Prefecture which is well known by Japanese people as the hometown of Japan. They call themselves "YAMATO, the Taiko drumming group that travels all over the world." They have given more than 4,500 shows across 54 countries around the world since their formation in 1993.

On stage, they are standing with more than 40 Taiko drums and all of them are having different characters. For example, their largest drum called "Odaiko", produced from a huge tree over 400 years old, is approximately two meters in diameter and weighs 500 kg. All other Taiko drums are different sizes and have different sounds. The members of the group have trained their bodies to the limit to beat these massive Taiko drums. The acoustic pressure far surpasses what one could imagine.

The troupe returns to The Soraya to perform $\wedge \mathcal{O} \supset \mathcal{D}$ Hito no chikara | *The Power of Human Strength*. Of this performance, the troupe writes:

Technology is a tool,
It is humans who wield it.
With the advancement of technology,

An era where technology possesses intelligence.
Will humans become tools used by technology?
What will become of human existence?
In this age where humans are alive,
Beat the Taiko drum.
Made of a huge wooden body and cowhide,

DEFYING GRAVITY: AN EVENING WITH STEPHEN SCHWARTZ AND FRIENDS

Stephen Schwartz wrote the music and lyrics for the current Broadway hit *Wicked* and has also contributed music and/or lyrics to *Godspell*, *Pippin*, *The Magic Show*, *The Baker's Wife*, *Working* (which he also adapted and directed), *Rags*, and *Children of Eden*. He collaborated with Leonard Bernstein on the English texts for Bernstein's *Mass* and wrote the title song for the play and movie *Butterflies Are Free*. For children, he has written songs for two musicals, *Captain Louie* and *My Son Pinocchio*. He has also worked in film, collaborating with Alan Menken on the songs for Disney's *Enchanted* as well as the animated features *Pocahontas* and *The Hunchback of Notre Dame*, and writing the songs for the DreamWorks animated feature *The Prince of Egypt*. His first opera, *Seance on a Wet Afternoon*, was produced at Opera Santa Barbara and New York City Opera. A book about his career, *Defying Gravity*, has been released by Applause Books. Schwartz has been inducted into the Theatre Hall of Fame and the Songwriters Hall of Fame and has been given a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame. Awards include three Academy Awards, four GRAMMY® Awards, and a tiny handful of tennis trophies.
