(Los Angeles, CA) Jan. 2, 2025 — The world-renowned **Chicago Symphony Orchestra (CSO)**, led by Music Director Emeritus for Life **Riccardo Muti**, will make its debut at The Soraya with a program that includes Brahms's final symphony, Hindemith's dramatic masterwork *Mathis der Maler*, and Strauss Jr.'s sweepingly romantic Overture to *The Gypsy Baron*. This performance is part of CSO and Maestro Muti's seven-city tour across the western United States.

The CSO concert on Thursday, Jan. 22 is one of five Crystal Series events celebrating The Soraya's [15th Anniversary](#). These performances highlight The Soraya's commitment to connecting audiences with world-class artists and international performing arts.

"Over the last 15 years, The Soraya has presented some of the world's finest orchestras, shining in the venue's exceptional acoustics," said Soraya Executive and Artistic Director Thor Steingraber. "As a native-born Chicagoan who grew up attending CSO concerts, I relish the idea of bringing them to The Soraya before my tenure concludes. I am grateful to lead underwriter Anthony Pritzker, a fellow Chicagoan and great L.A. arts supporter."

The CSO concert will be followed by an intimate dinner celebrating The Soraya's 15th Anniversary and the final season of Executive and Artistic Director Thor Steingraber. Funds raised from this dinner will benefit the 15th Anniversary as well as the newly announced [Thor Steingraber Fund for Artistic Innovation](#), which will ensure The Soraya's programming excellence into the future by securing funds for original programming.

About the Program

On rare occasions has The Soraya's Great Hall resounded with Brahms, the Romantic composer often grouped with Bach and Beethoven as the most important composers of two centuries of music, encompassing the Baroque, Classical, and Romantic periods.

Johannes Brahms' **Symphony No. 4** directly alludes to both Bach and Beethoven. Capping the most prolific period of his career, the 1885 masterpiece has been called his greatest. Just weeks before his death of cancer in 1897, Brahms made his final public appearance at a concert of this composition, greeted with multiple prolonged ovations. The Chicago Symphony Orchestra is known for its mastery of Brahms, including recordings by notable conductors Georg Solti, James Levine, and Daniel Barenboim.

Paul Hindemith's ***Mathis der Maler*** (*Mathias the Painter*) questions the role of the artist in society, was composed in 1934 and performed by the Los Angeles Symphony the same year under the baton of Otto Klemperer

CSO will open the evening with the overture to Johann Strauss, Jr's ***The Gypsy Baron***, an operetta that premiered in Vienna in 1885 and became international success for the composer.

About Riccardo Muti, Music Director Emeritus for Life

Riccardo Muti is one of the world's preeminent conductors. The Chicago Symphony Orchestra's distinguished tenth music director from 2010 until 2023, Muti was named Music Director Emeritus for Life beginning with the 2023–24 Season.

His leadership has been distinguished by the strength of his artistic partnership with the Orchestra; his dedication to performing great works of the past and present, including eighteen world premieres to date; the enthusiastic reception he and the CSO have received on national and international tours; and twelve recordings on the CSO Resound label, with four Grammy awards among them. In addition, Muti's contributions to the cultural life of Chicago—with performances throughout its many neighborhoods and at Orchestra Hall—have made a lasting impact on the city.

Born in Naples, Riccardo Muti studied piano under Vincenzo Vitale at the Conservatory of San Pietro a Majella, graduating with distinction. He subsequently received a diploma in composition and conducting from the Giuseppe Verdi Conservatory in Milan under the guidance of Bruno Bettinelli and Antonino Votto. The Soraya has assembled a company of musicians who are entirely 2026 Grammy nominees – pianist and music director Gerald Clayton, L.A.-based gospel choir Tonality, and jazz vocalists Christie Dashiell, and Michael Mayo. Opening The Soraya's 5th-annual Jazz at Naz festival, Clayton brings us *Sacredness*, his rendering of the work Duke Ellington considered his most important, the three Sacred Concerts that were performed between 1965 and 1973 in cathedrals

and churches in San Francisco and New York City. Ellington evoked a Cotton Club revue meets the African American Church that has endured as nondenominational and universal.
